Goldenrod is a fabulous plant for late season garden color and is an important butterfly nectar plant. Despite it's bad rap, Goldenrod does not cause fall allergies. Goldenrod pollen is sticky and is spread by insects. It is not wind-borne and is not wafting in the breeze making you sneeze. The credit for the sniffy nose goes to Ragweed.

So treat yourself to one of the many species of goldenrods. There are goldenrods for sun or shade, tall ones and short ones....no garden is complete without one! Pictured above is stiff goldenrod -- a perfect combo with the mauve dried seed heads of joe pye weed or boneset.
